

Top Ten Cool Things to Do in Colorado Springs

Visit the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center, 1 block south of campus, 30 W Dale st. Admission \$5, open 10am-5 pm, closed Mondays.

Booklovers paradise: Walk to Downtown (6 blocks south) and browse Bijou Bookfinders or the Bookbroker on Bijou St east of Tejon St. Lots of fine shopping in the area.

Walk or run in Monument Valley Park (along the stream just west of campus, enter on Cache La Poudre St.) The trail goes 10 miles south.



Visit the Garden of the Gods, 1805 North 30th St. Incredible city owned park and a National Natural Landmark.Tours for fee. Free entrance, 5 am-11 pm.

Visit the US Olympic Training Center (corner of Union Blvd and Boulder). Free admission, guided tours hourly open 9 am -5 pm.

Visit the Colorado Springs Pioneers Museum highlighting the gold rush of 1859. Free admission, open 10-4 pm; closed Sundays and Mondays.

Visit the Money Museum of the American Numismatic Association – adjacent to campus and the world's largest repository of coins, paper money and medals. 818 North Cascade Ave, Admission \$5, 10:30 am – 5 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday
